



It won't bite!





"Still sits the schoolhouse by the road,

The jack-knife's carved initial;


The charcoal frescoes on its wall;

Early last year, the talk of consolidating the surrounding districts with district No. 15, came up. It was up to the Board to discuss this problem. After many hours of studying the problems, it was decided that we should consolidate the surrounding schools.

No, their work was not over. It had just begun. They had to plan the territory for consolidation. They had to decide what, when, where, and how things would be done. The Board worked energetically days and nights. After the smoke had cleared, the public learned that this new plan would consolidate about 200 square miles into one district. About 950 students have enrolled, with 240 enrolling in this high school.

The consolidation was only one of the many duties that our Board has performed. We have them to thank for our wonderful school and all of its opportunities.


